

We got you covered. This twist on Italian cuisine is a hearty and easy meal that the whole family will love.



Chicken Piccata Pockets:

Ingredients:

- 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 tablespoons capers, drained
- 1 large shallot, finely chopped
- 1 sheet frozen puff pastry, thawed
- 4 chicken tenderloins, cubed
- 1 large egg, well beaten
- 1 tablespoon water
- 4 thin lemon slices
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 425°. Beat cream cheese, lemon juice, salt and pepper on medium speed until well combined. Fold in capers and shallot.
- 2. Unfold puff pastry; roll into a 12-in. square. Cut into 4 smaller squares. Spread cream cheese mixture over squares to within 1/4 in. of edges; top with chicken.
- 3. Fold a corner of each pastry square over chicken, forming a triangle. Pinch triangle edges to seal and flatten with fork for tighter seal. Whisk egg and water; brush over pastry pocket, including edges. Discard leftover egg mixture. Pierce each pocket twice with a fork to vent.
- 4. Bake on a parchment-lined baking sheet until golden brown, 18-25 minutes. Remove from oven; cool 5 minutes. Serve pockets with lemon slices and parsley.

Getting a Head Start By: Greg Lusk

I am often asked what can I be doing in the gardens during this time of year. I'm ready for spring and wish there was something to do... well there is, quite a bit, actually. One of the best gardening activities is simply planning for the coming growing season and getting a jump on certain garden activities that will make a great impact later in the season. If you didn't make notes on last years garden, you can do so now. Picture what went well and what did not. Then decide if there was a clear reason for your success. Can the reason be something you did or didn't do? If you felt like a plant did well, then plan on using it again and building around it. Tired of the same old thing? Maybe try a different color scheme using those same garden worthy plants to revamp your plantings, or if you're a vegetable gardener you may want to try new varieties bred especially for container gardening. There are some clear advantages to container gardening in our climate, but you must do some research to determine just what you will grow. Also, it's time to order seeds if you will be growing some of the bedding plants yourself. Keep in mind the local nurseries may not carry varieties for specialty gardening such as container vegetables. Take a little time to read the information on the back of the seed packets. Starting seeds too early may result in low quality transplants that are leggy and weak and be sure to harden them off before planting them out. Our last average frost date is April 12th so use the information on the back of the seed packet or the plant label to determine the proper time to plant.

Other garden activities that can be done now are garden cleanup and soil preparation. You can cut your perennials back 2 to 4 inches and apply a fresh layer of mulch. Mulch can be applied any time of the year but applying mulch now will help keep the soil from warming too fast which forces early growth, and the mulch will help to deter weeds from getting a strong hold while conserving soil moisture. If you are doing your soil amending, you can do that now and get it out of the way. This will allow soil microbial activity to be well underway at the time of planting resulting in quicker root establishment and therefore stronger plants before hot weather arrives.

Now is also a good time to inspect and make repairs or upgrades to our watering system. If you need professional help, you will have a better chance of getting them out now rather than in May when everyone else needs their professional attention.

Whatever you decide to do, do it with passion and joy, and look at it as an opportunity for a new season of life. Gardening is good for us physically and mentally and an opportunity to improve the space around us and educate our minds. There is no such thing as a grumpy gardener.
